

As winter is coming to a close - hopefully soon - the Challenger staff wanted to know: What does a holiday mean to each ordinary person?


What is the significance of certain holidays?

Art teacher Danielle Baugh, who teaches drawing and painting, 3D design and photography, gives her suggestions on whether to draw on paper or digitally.

Q: Should you start with paper or digital when drawing?

- **A:** I think paper; it is more accessible to everyone
- Q: What is a good starting point for drawing?
- **A:** Start with shape and forms and adding value. A basic still life is a great way to start, and easy things to draw are basic shapes, fruit, vases, simple objects
 - Q: What supplies are good for beginners?
 - **A:** Pencil, eraser, and paper
 - Q: What did you start with when you started to draw?
 - A: Pencil, sketch pad, and some colored pencils.
 - Q: Would you buy a drawing pad to draw digitally?
- **A:** It is always something I wanted to learn how to do, I just need to fine time to work and play with a digital drawing pad



Breaking down the debate of drawing on paper or digitally with what the Web says.

Q: What are good starting items to draw?

A: Starting with simple shapes. You should think about the entire form in order to represent a three-dimensional object in two dimensions.

"YOU'RE NOT JUST DRAWING WHAT YOU SEE IN FRONT OF YOU. YOU'RE DRAWING THE OTHER SIDE AS WELL," ARTIST LUCAS ELLIOT SAID.

Q: What type of paper is the best for drawing?

A: In general, fine point tools like pens, markers, and pencils (colored or graphite) work best with smoother materials, while coarser grained media like charcoal require paper with more tooth (rougher paper). Draw on acid-free paper if you intend to save anything you create for a long time.

Q: Should you start with paper or digital when drawing?

A: Try drawing first by paper; it is the better of the two options. You can only do it on a computer if you have knowledge of sketch drawing principles and other things. Some illustrations must first be drawn on paper before being converted into final digital graphics.

Describing the advantages and disadvantages of drawing digitally and on paper

Q: How much is a simple drawing pad?

A: The Wacom Intuos is considered to be the best drawing tablet for beginners. Drawing tablets are a terrific way to make your creative work digital from the beginning. The Intuos gives the most control and precision for the least amount of money, and it is simple to install on Windows and Mac OS.

Q: What drawing app is the best to use?

A: No matter if you're using the iPad Pro and an Apple Pencil, the Galaxy Note and its S Pen, or a third-party stylus with your current smartphone, the greatest drawing applications for mobile devices can make all the difference when it comes to producing a work of art. Astropad Studio, Pixelmator, Autodesk Sketchbook, Adobe Photoshop Sketch, Adobe Illustrator Draw, Ibis Paint X, Adobe Fresco, Artflow, and Procreate are some of the software programs we provide.

Q: What is easy to draw digitally?

A: Draw what's in front of you. No matter what you do, your act of trying to capture what's in front of you will help.

Speech and debate is an extracurricular almost all schools have but are not taken advantage of and should be. Speech and debate can help a few things such as public speaking, researching, and socializing.

Public speaking is a big part of speech and debate because every time you talk it's in front of people. Research skills help reinforce your speeches or

cases in categories such as public forum, congressional debate, or mixed exempt. Finally, it helps you connect and socialize more by meeting so many people, it's easier to get along with others that compete because you see them so often and you have similar interests like speech and debate.

Another skill that can be learned through speech and debate is in depth thinking on topics you may not think about often, expanding your perspective and learning on more topics.

"One unique thing about debate is that students prepare and argue BOTH sides of a Congress bill or Public Forum resolution. Flexible thinking and thinking on your feet are essential for every career and a key issue in our society currently," speech and debate coach Aymi Paradise-Flores said.

In speech and debate, there are different categories you can compete in and some of the most popular are public forum, congressional debate, and speech events such as spontaneous speaking or mixed exempt.

"I would recommend public forum even though it can be intimidating at first. It is simple and you can have a lot of fun. You can also learn a lot from every

Congressional debate is another highly recommended category that is just as beneficial as public forum.

"I'd definitely recommend it to anyone who wants to do speech and debate but is scared up against someone else


of how intimidating going

While both categories are competitive and only one person or team can win, almost all the people who participate in those categories are polite, helpful and fun to be around.

During competitions there are multiple schools from all over the district and outside of the district so it can be overwhelming, but it's not as overwhelming when you have a feeling of comfort being around others you

What Are Popular Types Of Debate? L Speech! L Congress! L

Speech categories are very popular among the students. Two of the more popular ones are spontaneous speaking and mixed exempt. Spontaneous speaking is where you get three prompts that can be anything and you choose one. Once you choose, you get three minutes to prep then five minutes to do a speech on your topic. This is helpful to people new to speech and debate by getting them ready to speak in public and on their feet. Mixed exempt is similar to spontaneous speaking, but you are given a prompt. After you have 30 minutes with internet access to gather enough resources and information, you

make a seven-minute speech on the topic.

In congressional debate, the tcompetitors are given a list of laws/bills to research prior to the tournament. At the tournment, they begin by giving three-minute speeches on the bills along with one to two minutes of questioning. They go back and forth between the affirmative and negation sides of the bills or laws. They also get to vote on the bills or laws depending on whether they are on the affirmative or negation side, then they move on to the next. They usually get through about six to eight bills for competition.

Public Forum!

In public forum, you are in a team of two and you go up against another team of two. You debate the same topic for about a month and then it switches to a different one. Each team has a speaker one and speaker two, speaker one reads off a script to start and then second speaker rebuttals against the other team's speech and it goes back and forth. The format is first speech given, questioning, rebuttal, questioning, summary, and ends with final focus. The way to win is to convince your judge that your case outweighs the opponent's case. "I would recommend public forum even though it can be intimidating at first. It is simple and you can have a lot of fun. You can also learn a lot from every team you go against," sophomore Gavin Houchins-McCallum said.

A student would not recommend Arby's due to the lack of taste in their food.


"Arby's food is too expensive, and the food looks bad and nasty but curly fires are top five," Wood said. Students also disliked KFC.

These are just a few accomplishments for upcoming music artist Ze66y. An 18-year-old kid living in California chasing his dream of becoming a music artist. In July of 2020 on Spotify, he had 100 monthly listeners and around that time he had about six songs released. Now in May 2022, he has almost 220 thousand monthly listeners with almost 35 songs released from just him and many features.

I originally found Ze66y back on July 12, 2021. I found him from his song "LMK!" which is currently his biggest hit on Spotify with 2.5 million streams. His music has evolved over time as he has grown. His music used to be mainly his voice over the music in a calm flow. His voice was much louder than the beats he was singing on, so it made it a bit hard to hear the beat too. Now in his newer songs, his voice is more with the music rather than over it and his flow can be faster with a more aggressive tone.

For this reason, his music is unique because he can switch styles very easily. Since he can easily switch

styles in his songs, he grows his audience. The more variety he has, the more people may be appealed to his songs, making it so he has more listeners.

He makes songs that can be classified as sad and affect your feelings like the song "Bad Weather." He can also make songs with a more aggressive flow and more upbeat songs like "Run!" or "2faces." Or he can create songs that are both a sort of aggressive tone and about love like his song "LMK!" The genre of music he makes is a smaller genre named "aesthetic rap." If you like when artists make a variety of types of music, I would say you might like his music.

He has made many songs with other people that have hundreds of thousands of plays. When I think of his features, the first things that pop into my mind are his songs with another artist named Bumboi. The first song that he did with him was a song named "Luna Llena," which means full moon. It is a more aggressive song, but it is not overly fast. One of the main features of the song is it is on a Mexican-style beat. This song, since its release on July 7, 2021, has gained over 3 million streams on Spotify.

Another big song with Ze66y on the feature is one named "White Gold." He made this song with an artist named Lil God Dan. It has a faster flow and they talk

about girls and their success. One of the main things they also talk about in the song is "White Gold" or jewelry in general that they have got from their success making music.

One of the latest songs that comes to mind when talking about features is "Bad Weather" with Ivri another musical artist who makes slower lofi kind of songs. This song is not aggressive at all; it is a slow-paced sad heartbreak type of song. It talks about his girl troubles and how one day he will feel better and there will be no more bad weather. Since the release of this song on April 9, 2022, it has generated 650 thousand plays on Spotify, making it a successful and big song for both artists involved.

My top three favorite songs from ze66y are his songs "Fool," "Alone," and "Don't go to sleep." They are all different in their ways. "Fool" is a love song about how he wants to give his love to a girl without looking like a fool. "Alone" is a song that he uses to talk about how he doesn't want to be alone and walking by himself.

"Don't go to sleep" is a relaxing heartbreak song about how he needs to let go because the one he texts doesn't care about him anymore. When it was released, he told people on Instagram that they should make their profile pictures the same as the cover of the song that he released. The picture was of a Pokémon named Gengar and there were thousands of people with the picture sharing the song. An extra thing he did was Ze66y followed back anyone with the profile picture. It was a fun thing to interact with his fans and show that he cares about them.

If I had to rate Ze66y as an artist, I would give him an 8.5/10. I love how his style is constantly changing and he collaborates with all types of people who make similar music to him and different kind of music. I really like how interactive he is with his fans and how he always responds to fans on Instagram stories and is always positive. The last thing I really like is how he uses Tik Tok to spread his music. He also uses it to show snippets of upcoming songs, generating hype so people listen to more of his songs and follow his socials to keep up with releases. Currently, he has 140 thousand followers, 4.4 million likes, and his highest viewed video is 1.1 million views.

The biggest problem is the only songs he releases are singles. I feel like an album or EP could make his following grow even more and he could have a variety of songs on it because of how diverse his music style is. An album or EP could make things more exciting because it would be multiple songs at once making it so his library of songs grows more making it so it can appeal to more people.

Over the next year or so, I can see him growing even more because he dropped his newest song last month which is a song with another artist named Lames. The song is about lies and how the girl can call him whenever she wants if she needs him.

It is just a matter of time until he is a known name to most people who listen to rap/love songs. For being 18 years old, he is very talented and has shown he has the ability to switch genres/styles easily and his followers will go with him, and he will gain even more.


